- **21 out of the 33 grants (63.6%) benefited underserved/low-income communities.**

- **3 out of the 33 grants (9.1%)** specifically benefited refugees in San Diego. San Diego is a federally qualified refugee city, which means that San Diego is eligible to receive selective federal funding based on the number of refugees entering San Diego in a five year period. Federal funding requirements indicate that a city must receive 500 refugees within a five year period. Since 1975, California has received 750,000 refugees.
