Alpha Project for the Homeless: Neil Good Day Center - \$45,000

Program Purpose: To prepare homeless men and women to successfully integrate into the workforce through education and training.		
Grant Purpose: For the creation and implementation of a learning center at the Neil Good Day Center – funding used to staff new Employment Specialist position, purchase computer equipment, and for minor construction costs.

PREP focuses on the family and community health benefits of successfully reintegrating former prisoners into the community.

Aquatic Adventures Science Education Foundation: Wetland Avengers Project - \$54,000

Program Purpose: To engage the underserved community in wetlands restoration on the SD River, and to engender life-long stewardship practices.		
Grant Purpose: For the expansion of three currently operational programs: the Wetland Education Program to fourth grade students in underserved schools in the City of San Diego, the annual community wide educational event, and the membership volunteer base of the Friends of the San Diego River Mouth.

Grant Purpose: To fund a portion of the construction of the Green Sea Turtle exhibit - a signature aquarium at the entry of the Chula Vista Nature Center.

Laguna Mountain Volunteer Assn/San Diego Fire Recovery Network: Education and Volunteer Programs - \$15,000

Program Purpose: The San Diego Fire Recovery Network, an alliance of agencies, conservation and community organizations, firefighters, and professional associations formed after the 2003 San Diego-area wildfires, seeks to develop scientifically sound and appropriate messages about living in a fire-dominated landscape, reach a large segment of the population, and develop an active and engaged public through volunteer activities and educational programs.		
Grant Purpose: Towards the first year operating, staffing, and material expenses to establish public information & education programs about fire recovery and protection of San Diego's natural environment.

San Elijo Lagoon Conservancy: Boardwalk Design and Interpretive Panels Program - \$30,000

Program Purpose: To complete the design of a raised boardwalk with interpretive signage to protect sensitive habitat and increase public awareness.		
Grant Purpose: To fund final architectural and structural engineering work on project, plus completion of interpretive educational panels.

Program Purpose: TPL is working in collaboration with the San Dieguito River Park Project and the San Dieguito River Valley Conservancy to purchase San Dieguito River Park properties for permanent protection, providing critical wildlife habitat and river protection, and offering recreational and educational opportunities.		
Grant Purpose: To support the significant project expenses related to the acquisition of five San Dieguito River Park properties.

Programs and activities that contribute to the creative expression, vitality and quality of life of the San Diego Region.

AJA Project: Journey Program - \$40,000

Program Purpose: The Journey Program provides arts education to refugee and immigrant youth from Somalia, Sudan, Columbia, Southeast Asia, Afghanistan, and Iraq. Specifically, it promotes the use of photography and story-telling as a means to empower youth to engage with their community; it also seeks to promote community understanding and tolerance of difference as well as acculturation through the exhibition of students' photos and the vocalization of students' stories.		
Grant Purpose: The purpose of the SDWF grant was to support the expansion of the Journey Program to recent immigrant students living in City Heights and El Cajon, to provide salary support, and to purchase a large-scale photography printer.

Program Purpose: The mission of Eveoke is to cultivate compassionate social action through arts education and evocative performance. The program's core values are excellence, access, and community building. Now in its 12th year, Eveoke's productions are consistently recognized for their relevance, virtuoso performances, choreography and design. It offers dance performance works, dance classes, and educational programs in the SD community.		
Grant Purpose: To expand its Young Artists' Program, by increasing the number of teen and college-age dancers and performers, and to include a program for younger dancers; to increase the number of performances as well as to expand the audience for performances; to provide stipends that would enable low-income youth to participate in its programs; and to support the salary of a performing group coordinator.

Grant Purpose: 1) to support Performing Outreach Program Tour (POP), a program that commissions a brand-new play addressing the real concerns of today's elementary children and brings the play to school children throughout the region, particularly to children in culturally diverse communities; 2) to support Extended Artist Residencies in Schools, a program designed to assist professional artists in working with school children on writing and performing their own plays; and 3) to support Professional Development for Classroom Teachers, a program which provides theater training for teachers in order to build capacity for arts education in under-funded local schools.

San Diego Museum of Art: Outreach and Family Festivals - \$37,000

Program Purpose: The SDMA Outreach Program provides arts experiences in local neighborhoods, in 6-12 week rotations, and therefore meaningful experiences for children and seniors. Quarterly, these same individuals are brought with their families to the Museum for no-cost Family Festivals, with free bus transportation provided. The Family Festivals are interactive and diverse, involving music and dance performances, demonstrations by artists, hands-on projects, and free bilingual gallery tours.		
Grant Purpose: To support four Family Festivals, and to support 16 after-school programs in 6-12 week programs.

Program Purpose: The San Diego Opera works with classroom teachers to provide 4th - 12th grade students with instructions on opera and opera etiquette as preparation for attending an actual performance.		
Grant Purpose: To introduce younger audiences to a main-stage opera experience, particularly those in underserved and disadvantaged neighborhoods throughout San Diego County. "Bridge" funds were sought for this 40 year old program, while searching for other funding sources for future years.

Program Purpose: A two year series of the Young People's Concerts consisting of three programs each year - to explore the creative process and the relationship between orchestral music and other art forms.

International Rescue Committee: First Things First - Parents as Teachers Program - \$25,000

Program Purpose: To add a component to an existing program, First Things First (FTF). The enhancement, named Parents as Teachers (PAT), is an early childhood educational program for refugee mothers and their preschool-aged children; it is designed to enhance family literacy and increase the potential for long-term educational success through home based instruction and interactive literacy activities.

Grant Purpose: For PAT staff training and to add staff hours for home visits.

The goals for Robotics were: to provide professional development programs for middle school teachers; and to support middle school students from underserved populations to participate in the Botball program and competition.
